MAYBE YOU CAN HELP

One of our parishioners volunteers at 'Shopfront', an archdiocesan agency established to help the homeless. Apparently, they are in need of non-perishable items for their larder. The following is a list of suggested items:

Non-Perishable food only...Pop Top Cans as most people living on the streets don't have can openers. Also, generic brands e.g. Coles are fine and are also cheaper. Small tins of tuna, Packets of noodles, the cheap version can be \$2 for 5 packets, Pasta, Pasta sauce, Tinned vegies-especially tomatoes, beans – nothing exotic, Small pkts cereal, especially weetbix, Long life milk-full cream, Tins of baked beans and spaghetti, Any sort of meal in a can e.g. chunky soup, tinned meat balls etc, Small coffees, Rice, Tinned fruit, Honey, Vegemite, peanut butter, Muesli bars Anything else that is nutritious and easy to prepare

FIFTH SUNDAY of LENT- Year B

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FIRST READING Jer. 31:31-34

A reading from the prophet Jeremiah.

See, the days are coming – it is the Lord who speaks – when I will make a new covenant with the House of Israel and the House of Judah, but not a covenant like the one I made with their ancestors on the day I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt. They broke that covenant of mine, so I had to show them who was master. It is the Lord who speaks. No, this is the covenant I will make with the House of Israel when those days arrive – it is the Lord who speaks. Deep within them I will plant my Law, writing it on their hearts. Then I will be their God and they shall be my people. There will be no further need for neighbour to try to teach neighbour, or brother to say to brother, 'Learn to know the Lord!' No, they will all know me, the least no less than the greatest – it is the Lord who speaks – since I will forgive their iniquity and never call their sin to mind.

GOSPEL Jn 12: 20-30

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John.

Among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. These approached Philip, who came from Bethsaida in Galilee and put this request to him. "Sir, we should like to see Jesus". Philip went to tell Andrew and Andrew and Philip together went to tell Jesus. Jesus replied to them:

'Now the hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. I tell you, most solemnly, unless a wheat grain falls on the ground and dies, it remains only a single grain, but if it dies, it yields a rich harvest. Anyone who loves his life loses it; anyone who hates his life in this world will keep it for the eternal life. If a man serves me, he must follow me, wherever I am, my servant will be there too. If anyone serves me, my Father will honour him. Now my soul is troubled. What shall I say: Father, save me from this hour? But it was for this very reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name!'

A MATTER OF TIME

In this fifth week of Lent, we approach the crux of our belief. We are drawing near to our journey through Passion Sunday and Holy Week. Jeremiah heralds, 'See the days are coming' and Jesus in the Gospel of John proclaims, "Now the hour has come!" These times are both important in their own context yet, also mark God's time.

Jeremiah's prophetic words announce God's new covenant with Israel, a covenant which God writes on their hearts that, "I will be your God and you will be my people". (Jer 31:33)

As John's passage opens, it is the time of the Passover and some Greeks want to see Jesus. Their seeking of Jesus affirms the words of the Pharisees earlier "the world has gone after him" (John 12:19). The Greeks approach Philip as he has a Greek name and Philip goes with Andrew, to Jesus. With the Greeks seeking him, Jesus recognises that the gathering has begun, "the world has gone after him," so he announces, "the hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified" (John 12:23). An Amen saying follows: "Very truly (Amen, amen), I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit" (John 12:24). In this image of a grain of wheat is firstly the revelatory sense of Jesus' fate, destiny and mission. Secondly, it is the way to see the disciples and our own lives and mission.
